A number of items were discussed at the A.G.M. to enhance the site including:

1. Providing a hard standing to the main entrance roadway.

This would cost in excess of £10,000.00 and would only benefit one or two cars but this could be offset with a grant. After discussion, it was felt that this would cost too much for the benefit it provided.

2. Fencing to the perimeter of the site.

It was agreed to get L.C.C. representatives in to discuss this and visit the site.

Nature Watch

As you know as an organisation we are committed to this project and, as allotmenteers, we hope that you will continue to join us in this wondrous project. If flora and fauna turn up again this year so much the better. However the aim is to capture (not literally) all of the birds, bees, insects and mammals on the site. So to help with this project, here are a few ideas of how to make your plot a little friendlier to all.

Hedgehog Houses

Check out the wildlife Trusts website, it's a very useful site for wildlife enthusiasts. Follow the link below to find out how to build a hedgehog home on your plot.

Remember:

Pick a shady, quiet spot to put your assembled hedgehog house and put some newspaper, leaves and dry grass inside.

Cover it with polythene sheeting (making sure it's still accessible for cleaning later on), and pack soil and dead leaves around the outside, leaving the entrance and air pipe free of debris.

Clear out the hedgehog house once a year (late March - early April) to prevent the build-up of pests. Do not clean it out if a hedgehog is in residence though!

Making a log pile or compost heap are also good options for providing space for hedgehogs to nest, and have the added bonus of attracting lots of insects for them to eat!

Insect Friendly Planting

Provide Shelter

Butterflies, bees and other pollinators need shelter to hide from predators, get out of the elements and rear their young. Let a hedgerow or part of your lawn grow wild for ground-nesting bees. Let a pile of grass cuttings or a log decompose in a sunny place on the ground. Or, allow a dead tree to stand to create nooks for butterflies and solitary bees. Artificial nesting boxes can also help increase the population of pollinators in your area. Wooden blocks with the proper-sized holes drilled into them will attract mason bees.

Plant nectar rich and pollen rich flowers

The most important step you can take is to plant a pollinatorfriendly garden. Choose nectar rich and pollen rich plants like wildflowers and old-fashioned varieties of flowers. The best plants for bees tend to be cottage varieties so, if your granny grew it, chances are the bees and other insects will love them too. Bedding plants like busy lizzies, petunias, geraniums and begonias may look colourful but provide little or no

nourishment for bees and other insects. Late summer is a critical time for bees and insects when food is often short. Fortunately, there are masses of colourful late-summer plants they'll happily feed on that can provide plenty of nectar and pollen for them.

Nature Watch

Provide food and water

A pollinator garden will provide pollen and nectar. Consider adding special feeders to help attract hummingbirds and butterflies. Bees, birds and butterflies also all need water. Install some kind of water garden, a birdbath or a catch basin for rain. Butterflies are attracted to muddy puddles which they will flock to for salts and nutrients as well as water.

What more can we do?

Go organic

Many pesticides – even the organic ones – are toxic to bees and other beneficial organisms. There's no need to use powerful poisons to protect your garden from insects and diseases. In the short term, they may provide a quick knock-down to the attackers, but they also kill beneficial organisms. In the long term, you expose yourself, family, pets and wildlife to toxic chemicals and risk disrupting the natural ecosystem that you and your garden inhabit.

Skip

A skip for Easter has been ordered and it will be here on the 8th April. There are a number of restrictions on what we may add to the skip; these include:-

- asbestos materials;
