
Our Review of the Year

We are looking to survey all the trees, on the site, mainly the non-fruit trees and self-seeded ones in the hedges. This will identify diseased and damaged trees on the site. Once we have this report we will let you know more. Remember if you are planning on planting trees on the site use those with a dwarf rooting stock (otherwise we end up with a Jack and the Beanstalk scenario) and that

non-fruiting trees are not allowed on the site.

We are hoping to do a small mammal survey of the site and perhaps organise a bird walk of the site in Spring and Autumn next year.

We are also looking to phase out the use of non-sustainable compost used on the site. This is in line with the RHS and National Trust and most other national organisations who all recommend the use of peat free or sustainable sourced compost. We currently sell sphagnum based compost which is from a non-sustainable source. During the next year you will

have a choice to purchase the old stock we currently have. We will in future be purchasing peat free compost which we have been selling for a number of years now. We have arranged a significant cost reduction for this product. The cost will be £4.50 per bag an increase from the non-sustainable stuff of around 50p.

Sustainable Compost

One of the great pleasures in life is opening a bag of seed compost and sinking your hand deep inside. It's not just that it's deliciously soft; it's knowing that this is the key to starting off a healthy plant. OK, maybe it's not one of life's pleasures, but it's one of February's great joys. This is usually the first serious start to spring. Sweet peas, chillies, leeks, onions, snapdragons, cosmos and on and on until summer. It all starts in a good bed of fine compost. Because of this it is important that we all move to using compost from a sustainable source. As we mentioned earlier we hope to move to providing this by the end of 2019. This will mean that we will be changing our current supplies and of course this will mean a small increase in cost. We will try to keep this to a minimum (around 50p) but what price can you put on trying (in our own small way) of saving the planet. Well it's about 50p I guess.

We currently do not use peat based compost on the site but if you do please remember that peatlands are fragile, important habitats that act as huge carbon sinks, absorbing greenhouse gases from our atmosphere. It makes no sense to damage one home to make another. We are looking into other alternatives to the sphagnum based compost we currently buy as this is not from a sustainable source and will be replacing this with another variety. We do of course (and have done so for many years) provide a peat free alternative in the hut.

Make your own Compost

The best way to ensure you are using compost from a sustainable source is to make your own compost this can take up to a year but at least you know what you are using to grow seedlings and what you are putting on your plot.

The best time to make some is in spring, because it will rot down faster. It's dead easy to make, it costs nothing and it does the garden a whole lot of good.

The recipe for success when it comes to composting is keeping the compost hot to kill off weed seeds and diseases

- 2 parts carbon (newspaper, cardboard, straw) to 1 part nitrogen (vegetable waste, grass).
- Perennials (plants and shrubs that have a lifecycle of over two years dandelions, thistles, bay etc.) should be avoided as they will take over the heap by rooting.
- Compost mixture should be aerated by turning it over regularly and allowing it to get wet without losing moisture.
- Covering your compost with cardboard apparently helps moisture to get in, while it also prevents it from evaporating.
- The minimum space for composting should be no less than 1 meter squared.

Email



This is used to keep you updated with information, Newsletters, the Annual Show and A.G.M. This is also used for those of you who have chosen to have paperless invoicing. You can unsubscribe to this at any time.

Telephone



Used as an emergency contact; in the case of vandalism or if there is any other damage to your plot that you may need to attend to. It would help if you can provide a mobile and home telephone number if you have both.

Not having your up to date contact details could mean that you may lose your plot if important correspondence is sent to the wrong address.
